Hello and welcome to your Optometry Scotland Newsletter

IT'S HARD to believe that 6 months have passed since the last newsletter there has been so much going on! The main thing keeping OS busy has been intense negotiation and work with the Scottish Government on changes to the GOS Regulations. The changes were due to take place in October but have now been deferred until January 2010 due to the prolonged negotiation undertaken by OS on behalf of the profession.

The reason for negotiations taking place at all was the agreement in Dec 2007 which allowed us to receive the £40/£44 eye exam fee. This amount was based on a change in the regulations surrounding primary versus supplementary fees i.e. that primary eye exams would be carried out at normal recall intervals (usually 1 or 2 years) as appropriate and that EVERYTHING else in between e.g. flashes/floaters, headaches, red eye etc would be a supplementary.



As the regulations were being changed we felt that this would be a good opportunity to sort out all the anomalies within the regs – all the things that confuse us.

Well it's been a bit of a marathon and it hasn't all gone our way. Due to the current financial climate the Government are very concerned about optometry costs and getting value for money from Optometrists.

Frank Munro had spent a lot of time preparing a set of extremely user friendly regulations which we were keen for the Government to adapt. Unfortunately this wasn't to be and we've been given a set of regulations which we feel aren't as easy to understand as we'd like. With this in mind we will organise roadshows with NES to explain the regulations. We'll run these roadshows in Inverness, Aberdeen, Edinburgh, and Glasgow. It's hoped that as many Optoms as possible will attend. We'd also like to back up these roadshows with an explanatory DVD.

We definitely have had to give some ground to save the public purse. We hope that this is not at cost of professional freedom. We are assured that this is not the intention.

The highlights are as follows:-

As previously indicated the main change is that primary eye exams will be carried out at the normal recall intervals and EVERYTHING else in between will be a supplementary.


Refraction has been put in as part of the primary exam. The Government were very insistent on this, however we do have a get out clause which will allow us to omit refraction if it isn't clinically appropriate.

Field testing on over 60's is required on first visit or at first exam after 60th birthday (previously the regs had required field testing on everyone over 60).

It is now clearer that a supplementary exam can be claimed for any under 60 dilation.

There are going to be lots of questions with regards to the new regs. Hopefully most will be covered in the roadshows.

OS will keep all our members posted on the developments of the GOS regs. by email. Scottish Eyecare Group

The Scottish Eyecare Group (SEG), the group that is made up of Ophthalmologists from Eyecare Scotland, Optometrists from OS with RNIB representing patients now has £30K funding issued to RNIB from the Scottish Government to be used to promote MCNs.

We are looking to set up "implementation groups". These groups will include – Eyecare Scotland members, Health Board representatives, Optoms and chairs of each AOC.

The groups will meet every 2-3 months and report back to the Exec group (The group that meets at present).

We were thinking of more than one group e.g. glaucoma, and, acute services.

After discussions at the SEG's last meeting in August, it was decided to concentrate on one topic – Glaucoma since this is the hot topic of the moment because of the NICE guidelines.
